The films explore peoples relationships with English rural spaces.



During the COVID-19 pandemic, many people realised how important nature and open spaces are for our health and mental well-being.

But not everyone is able to access rural spaces and because of that many people don't feel connected to the English countryside.




In the year 2019, a government study found that many people from Black, Asian and diverse ethnic backgrounds see the countryside as a place only for white, middle-class people. And the countryside could no longer matter to large groups of people in the UK as the society changes.



The presented films try to challenge the ideas of the rural space as a peaceful place that doesn't change, and ask the question how can nature be a place of protest, activism and difference?


There are three films in the Right of Way screening.



A film by Dan Guthrie is called black strangers. It was made in the year 2022 and it is 8 minutes long.

It is about a man named "Daniel" who was called a "black stranger" in a bishop's document in the Gloucestershire Archives and was buried in Nympsfield in year 1719.

In the film, the filmmaker Dan, talks directly to Daniel about things they have in common and how Dan's experiences in his hometown are similar to what Daniel might have experienced. A film directed by Arjuna Neuman is called Syncopated Green. It was made in the year 2022 and it is 14 minutes long.



It is about the history of outdoor free parties in the English countryside. The film uses electronic dance music from past and present to help viewers forget the image of England as beautiful, nostalgic, white and rural, and to challenge England's imperial history.

The film asks the question: how might our future be different if we had different histories to learn from and celebrate?

Imperial means something related to an empire or a powerful country that tries to control or influence other countries or territories.

Content Notes:

The film Syncopated Green has reasonable flashing images and strobe lights.



A film by Ufuoma Essi is called Pastoral Malaise. It was made in the year 2022 and it is 11 minutes long.


"Pastoral Malaise," explores what is left out, not shown or talked about in rural environments that are often seen as beautiful and peaceful. The rural spaces are popular tourist destinations in Britain who use it for escape, rather than understand their complexity and diversity.

Those three films were made together with the Independent Cinema Office. The films are part of an archival project that celebrates the history of the National Trails in England. The films will screen at these times:


Screening 1 Time



Screening 1 starts at 12:45PM and ends at 13:35PM


The screening will open 30 minutes before the films start at 12:15 PM
